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Potter Electric Addressable Pull Stations Recall.

Potter Electric Recalls Addressable Pull Stations Due to Failure to Alert to Fire. This recall involves Potter Electric Addressable Pull Stations. When manually pulled, these red-colored devices are intended to activate a fire alarm in commercial and other buildings. The pull handle on some units can fail to activate the fire alarm system when manually pulled, posing a risk of failure to alert consumers to a fire. Consumers should immediately contact Potter Electric or their fire alarm system dealers/installers for a free replacement.

Please note, image shared below from Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is of a single action pull station. The dual action pull station is also included in this recall.

Northern Tool & Equipment Recalls Powerhorse Portable Generators Due to Shock Hazard. Name of product: Northern Tool & Equipment Powerhorse 13000ES Portable Generators

Hazard: The portable generators have a wiring error which can result in an electrical shock to users.

Remedy: Repair

Description:

This recall involves Northern Tool & Equipment Powerhorse 13000ES Portable Generator Model #799215. The gasoline generator is blue with white Powerhorse logos, a black frame and two wheels. Powerhorse 13000ES is printed in white on the top front. Serial numbers for the recalled generators are listed in the chart below. The serial number is located on the lower left of the frame.

Proposed Rule to Update OSHA Hazard Communication Standard.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) today – February 5, 2021 - issued a proposed rule to update the agency's Hazard Communication Standard (HCS) to align with the seventh revision of the Globally Harmonized System of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals (GHS).

OSHA expects the HCS update will increase worker protections, and reduce the incidence of chemical-related occupational illnesses and injuries by further improving the information on the labels and Safety Data Sheets for hazardous chemicals. Proposed modifications will also address issues since implementation of the 2012 standard, and improve alignment with other federal agencies and Canada.

Individuals may submit comments identified by Docket No. OSHA-2019-0001, electronically at https://www.regulations.gov, which is the Federal e-Rulemaking Portal. Read the Federal Register Notice for details. The deadline for submitting comments is April 19, 2021.

8th Annual National Stand-Down to Prevent Falls in Construction.

The 8th Annual National Stand-Down to Prevent falls in Constructions is planned for May 3-7 2021. Of the 1,008 recorded deaths in 2018 for construction employees, 320 of them were from *preventable falls*. Did you know that Fall Protection has topped the list of OSHA's Top Ten Cited Violations for the last nine years? Fire Exit Violations Fineable under OSHA Standards.

Did you know that some NFPA Standards and Codes are covered under the OSHA Standards? It is called Incorporation by Reference. For example, in CFR 1910.35, Subpart E, Exit Routes and Emergency Planning Standard, OSHA references NFPA 101 – Life Safety Code which made it enforceable and fineable.
