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Hudson River Valley Chapter Elections in April.

It is that time again for our Hudson River Valley Chapter elections. At this time, the positions that will be open to the election process are; Chapter Vice President, Chapter Treasurer, and Chapter Secretary. Any chapter member in good standing that would like to become involved in the governing and operational side of the chapter can nominate themselves as a candidate for these offices. You should let the existing chapter secretary know you want to be a candidate as soon as possible so that you can be included on the slate of candidates to be announced to the general membership by a special email in April of 2022, that will mark the beginning of the election process.

The election results will be announced in the June Newsletter as well as a special email to the general membership of the Hudson River Valley chapter. The newly elected candidates will officially take office on July 1, 2022, and serve a term of two (2) years that will expire on June 30, 2024. Remember, you must be a member of the Chapter to participate and vote in the chapter election process. Of course as always members can also help the Chapter as a volunteer, your help will be greatly appreciated.

Join the Annual Stand Down to Prevent Falls in Construction.

The National Safety Stand-Down to Prevent Falls in Construction will take place May 2 - 6, 2022. The purpose of the Safety Stand-Down is to raise fall hazard awareness across the country in an effort to stop fall fatalities and serious injuries in the construction industry. Fatalities caused by falls from elevations continue to be a leading cause of death for construction employees. Deaths involving falls from elevations accounted for 351 of the 1,008 construction fatalities recorded for the year 2020 according to data gathered by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). The worst part is that those deaths were preventable. A Safety Stand-Down is a voluntary event for employers to talk directly to employees about safety. You can make this the beginning point of a continued effort to discuss safety with and for the employees, why wait for a once a year event? Nothing shows it is just a check-off box on a management clipboard to meet an objective more. If you are a manager or supervisor of a work crew, you must demonstrate that it is a continuing, evolving plan that can be adopted to any hazardous situation or condition on the job. Anyone who wants to prevent hazards in the workplace can participate in the Stand-Down. Companies can conduct a Safety Stand-Down by taking a break to have a toolbox talk or another safety activity such as conducting safety equipment inspections, developing rescue plans, or discussing job specific hazards. Managers are encouraged to plan a stand-down that works best for their workplace anytime. See Suggestions to Prepare for a Successful "Stand-Down" and Highlights from the Past Stand-Downs. OSHA hosts an Events page with events that are free and open to the public to help employers and employees find events in your area. If you plan to host a free event that is open to the public, please contact your Regional Stand-Down Coordinator. Employers will be able to provide feedback about their Stand-Down and download a Certificate of Participation following the Stand-Down. Hot Work Types and Hazards.

Do you know the types of work that are classified as "Hot Work"? You might be surprised. According to OSHA, the following are all considered types of Hot Work: Burning; Welding: Cutting; Brazing; Soldering; Grinding; using fire – or spark-producing tools; or other work that produces a source of ignition – are all hot work".

Employers need to create a program to insure hot work is performed safely. OSHA states that an effective program should take into consideration the following:

- Before issuing a hot work permit (which should be prepared in advance of work beginning), a job
 hazard assessment needs to be conducted. That includes getting input from workers knowledgeable of
 the potential dangers.
- Before work begins, implement controls to eliminate identified hazards.
- If hazards develop during work operations, routine monitoring must be conducted to ensure these hazards do not pose a risk to workers.
- If the hazards cannot be mitigated, operations must be stopped and the elimination of hazards verified before hot work begins again.
- Share with all workers relevant information about ongoing operations that could create hazardous conditions.
- Workers familiar with the hot work process should be available to assist specialty subcontractors to ensure safe working conditions.
